	The Council will consult the community regarding any changes to the Revenue and Financing Policy, and will consider any feedback received. Having done so, any decisions regarding the funding of Council activities will rest with the Council.							
Explanation of Terms Used	Capital Value: The value a property is expected to receive at the time of valuation if offered for sale on reasonable terms and conditions.							
	Development Contributions: Charges on future lots or units of demand to fund the growth portion of capital expenditure (such as upgraded infrastructure, new reserves, etc).							
	District Wide Rate: District wide collection of revenue based on a set number of cents per dollar of the capital value of every property, or a uniform annual general charge (UAGC).							
	Targeted Rate: Is a rate within a rating area or other defined area and may be based on cents per dollar of capital value of every property or a fixed amount per rating unit (known for the purposes of this policy as a "Uniform Annual Charge"). Money is spent in that area only.							

	 Uniform Annual Charge (UAC): Within the context of this policy, this is a Targeted Rate for a set dollar amount collected for each rateable property (or each separately used or inhabited part of a property) in the District as a whole or within part of the District for a specific Council service (e.g. water supply, sewerage, amenities etc). Uniform Annual General Charge (UAGC): This is a set dollar amount which is collected for each rateable property or each separately used or inhabited part of a property, in the District for a specific Council service (e.g. water supply, sewerage, amenities etc).

	Units of demand: Units of demand are defined as a rating unit or a separately used or inhabited part of a rating unit.
	User Charges: Charges collected from individuals at the time service is used.
Costs and benefits of funding activities separately	The Hurunui District includes diverse urban and rural areas, and covers and extensive geographical area. Hence, the needs of the communities and the levels of service received by different communities vary.
	Accordingly, targeted rates are used to fund part or, in some cases, all of many activities, particularly where there are differing levels of service in different locations and/or where the costs of carrying out those activities are identifiable. This supports transparency and promotes equity. While there is some administrative cost associated with the use of a number of targeted rates, this is relatively minimal.
	For some activities, it is possible to levy user charges to cover some or all of the cost of the activity. In considering whether and/or how much to levy, the Council has regard for the likely costs of collecting the charge, the practicability of doing so for that activity, and any statutory provisions which may apply.
